- The Truer Story of the Chan Family: Chinese American playwright and wannabe social influencer seeks fame and fortune, American-style by exploiting her family's Gold Rush history as sex traffickers and vaudevillians, only to be set straight by family ghosts in a musical odyssey through America's anti-Asian hate and filial Chinese expectation. Directed by Erin Mei-Ling Stuart.
- Ten Times Better: George Lee is an 88-year-old blackjack dealer who still works 5 days a week. He's a familiar and beloved figure at the Four Queens Casino in Las Vegas. But none of those card players knows his astonishing story or his place in ballet history. A child dance prodigy who grew up poor in Shanghai. It's a uniquely American story: an immigrant striving to prove himself. As Asian pioneer in ballet and on Broadway, his artistry as a dancer was recognized by no less than Balanchine and Gene Kelly, who cast him in the original production of Flower Drum Song. Petition to Save the Japanese Fishing Village on Terminal Island

For more than 40 years, Terminal Island in the Port of Los Angeles was home to a Japanese American community of some 3,000 residents, supporting a thriving fishing and cannery industry before the start of World War II. After Japan attacked Pearl Harbor, amid a wave of anti-Japanese paranoia, the residents of the Japanese fishing village on Terminal Island were forcibly displaced and imprisoned in concentration camps. Soon after, the Navy bulldozed most of the village. Miraculously, two buildings from the Japanese fishing village have survived to this day. Located on the community's main commercial thoroughfare at 700-702 and 712-716 Tuna Street, they housed a dry-goods store called Nanka Shoken (est. 1918) and the A. Nakamura Co. grocery store (est. 1923). Now, the Port of Los Angeles has proposed demolishing these buildings. This would mean the complete erasure of this community's presence — which is deeply concerning, especially to those with direct ties to Terminal Island and these two businesses. This important heritage must be preserved for future generations!

An exhibit of the work of Minnie Negoro, a potter of the American Studio Ceramics movement and founder of the UConn ceramics program. She was finishing her senior year at UCLA in 1942 when her family was incarcerated at Heat Mountain, Wyoming. Negoro left camp two years later to study at Alfred University's preeminent ceramics program, going on to win the Everson Museum's prestigious Gump Award. Her work has been shown internationally and locally at museums including the Smithsonian, the Museum of Modern Art, and the Benton. The exhibition is curated by History & Social and Critical Inquiry professors Hana Maruyama and Jason Chang, and celebrates the 60^{th} anniversary of the UConn ceramics program.
