Inspired by the life of Easton's grandmother, *White Mulberry* is a moving portrait of a young Korean woman in 1930s Japan who is torn between two worlds and must reclaim her true identity to provide a future for her family. In 1928, Japan-occupied Korea, 11-year-old Miyoung has dreams too big for her tiny farming village: to become a teacher, to avoid an arranged marriage, to write her own future. When she is offered the chance to live with her older sister in Japan and continue her education, she is elated, even though it means leaving her sick mother--and her very name--behind.
