Hosts Koii Steven Sakai and Michelle Malizaki delve into the intricate nature of genuine apologies and the actions that must accompany them to signify real growth and understanding. They share personal stories to illustrate the complexity of apologies in everyday life. The discussion then shifts to the historical significance of the Civil Liberties Act of 1988, which provided reparations to Japanese Americans incarcerated during World War II. Special guest **Keiko Agena** enriches the conversation by reading a part of the Act, emphasizing the importance of government acknowledgment and reparations. The episode offers a nuanced exploration of how official apologies can pave the way toward healing and understanding for marginalized communities, making it a must-listen for anyone interested in the power of words and deeds. Asian American Journalists Association Style Guide

The AAJA Style Guide offers guidance to journalists on how to avoid harmful stereotypes and weaponized language. "For example, it reminds journalists that 'illegal' can be used to describe an action, but applying it to an immigrant is inaccurate and dehumanizes the person described," AAJA said in a news release. The term 'kamikaze drone' is an inaccurate and insensitive way to describe an exploding unmanned aircraft. And the 120,000 Japanese Americans and Japanese nationals detained in the U.S. during WWII were 'incarcerated,' not 'interned.'" "After covering anti-Asian attacks and experiencing firsthand how words can be weaponized, this quide was a labor of love to create a resource to not only combat hate but also build up our communities to promote understanding," said Marian Chia-Ming Liu, AAJA V.P. of Civic Engagement. The Guide was the culmination of two years of work by more than 50 AAPI journalists across the country, some of whom have produced style guides for their own newsrooms, from The Washington Post to the Global Press. https://www.aajastyleguide.org/

The *abundance among us* table installation first created spaces for intergenerational gatherings in Boston's Chinatown in 2021. Co-designed by artist **Sheila Novak** and Chinatown resident **Cass Li** as part of Residence Lab, this functional artwork ensures that children and elders all have a seat at the same table, illustrating the abundance in community and emphasizing how individuals contribute to community power, regardless of their age. As folks gather, a golden dragon spans the entire table evoking the group's strength. Joining the team this year, artist **Wen-hao Tien's** new activity book for the Year of the Dragon called *dragons and friends* guides the project's community event in mythical storytelling. Inspired by Chinese fairytales, this project honors and celebrates the cultural vibrancy that persists over thousands of years. These activity books will not only include coloring and drawing games but will also evoke cultural legacies alive in the community, invigorating the relationship between generations and centering environmental thought. In the decade before the war, 3 Issei artists flourished in the thriving Japanese community before the mass incarceration changed the face of the neighborhood forever. Kamekichi Tokita (1897-1948), Kenjiro Nomura (1896-1956), and Takuichi Fujii (1891-1964) received widespread recognition and praise for their paintings, which provide an intimate view of what nihonmachi's familiar streets, alleys, storefronts and houses looked like before the war. In the American post-war years, the 3 artists fell into obscurity as the Japanese community struggled to rebuild their lives, but recently their life stories and artistic achievements have gradually been brought back to light.
